Online quantitative research

20-24th August 2015

- 1265 respondents aged 18-64
- National coverage
- Up-weighted to ABS data on age, highest level of schooling, sex and area to be representative of total population
- Participation anonymous




Launch of online streaming services



Piracy incidence has fallen


with a decline in the most active segment



Piracy activity by age group has also fallen




Except for the 35-49 age band

They are almost twice as active as the total population








II. A DECLINE IN CLAIMED FREQUENCY

At a total population level there is a fall in frequency – driven by downloading










III. LEGAL VIEWING REMAINS STRONG


Legal viewing remains strong





Streaming via online subscription shows growth





72% have heard about the launch of online streaming services in Australia (Netflix, Stan, Presto) *

Base: Total sample n=1265; Male n=629; Female n=635; 18-24 n=226; 25-34 n=311; 35-49 n=374; 50-64 n=353; Persistent illegal downloaders n=131; Casual illegal downloaders n=132; Non-pirates n=792.


B1. Thinking now about your general viewing of movies and TV shows. Please indicate how often, if ever, you do each of the following.

Whilst Foxtel dominates, Netflix Australia has quickly become established








III. PIRATING LESS...AND REASONS WHY?

All but persistent pirates say they are pirating less



Multiple factors reported as reasons for declining activity



REASON	% TOTAL
 Legal alternatives subscribed to a new streaming service got a free trial to a new streaming service was able to find the content I wanted online without pirating 	33%
 Moral Considerations felt bad about pirating because piracy is stealing / theft 	21%
 Self Interest I'm worried about getting viruses on my computer I'm worried about getting caught pirating 	16%
I didn't have time to do it anymore	13%
Other reason	13%

Of the 55% who claim they are pirating less often



Those who have pirated are more likely to be aware of anti piracy initiatives

The Copyright Amendment Bill which allows Australian courts to block access to websites that solely profit from pirated movies, TV shows or other pirated content

The warning letters to be sent by internet service providers to customers who have pirated content online

The owners of the movie "Dallas Buyers' Club" seeking compensation from people who have pirated the movie in Australia
